#### ONE-ON-ONES

21 Shows in 6 weeks??? Boarding and bedding over 50 people in two weeks?! The program title may be One-on-One, but it takes a small and highly enthusiastic army to produce these one acts. On August 4th, 10 adult/child pairings: Garrett Brown & Fran-Marie Fargardo; Leigh Curran & Samona Squire; Charles Dumas & Lori Quinones; Peter Herdrich, Karen Trott & Virginia Vargas; Fracaswell Hyman & Kulondi Frier; Peter MacNicol & Kristen Bess; Willie Reale & Danny Noonan; Hugh Sinclair & Ronnie Noonan; Pam Tyson & Tina Vamvoukakis; and Bill Wise, Jeff Williams & Alex Bess arrived on Block Island to begin work on the first set of plays under the title, "The Butler Did It!". Each adult writer was working with the proviso that in his/her play there had to be a butler (or someone named butler) who had done something. For the Block Island plays, Bill Wise not only wrote a play, but played the butler in all of the plays. During our week away, the daily schedule consisted of three hours of work each morning, an activity in the afternoon (including such things as horse back riding, boogie boarding, zoom fluming, scavenger hunting or everyone's all-time favorite, shopping), return to the main house for another hour of work then on to dinner and after-dinner play. Meals were feasts that fueled us throughout the day, and a wiffle ball game was never far away. For the first time on Block Island this year we tried out the "host family" concept which proved to be a huge hit for all concerned (most particularly for Mr. and Mrs. Reale who used to house all 10 kids under their roof). Once back in New York, all 10 plays were presented for 4 performances at E.S.T., and in less than a week, we were back on the road with 11 more kids en-route to Tannersville. Monica Jenkins; Craig Lucas & Annette Myrie; Jackie Reingold & Jill Barbosa; Kathy Rossetter & Shirley Rumierk; and Sandye Wilson & David Stevens. This time, Don Berman played the butler.



The Tannersville One-on-Ones were performed at E.S.T. on September 6th, 7th and 8th to full-houses and thunderous applause. The One-on-Ones are at the heart of the Project - where old and new kids have the opportunity to work with professionals, leave the city and shine onstage. The generous donation of time, talent and love by Project volunteers (onstage, backstage, hanging lights, picking up costumes and collecting tickets) made these summers' magnum opuses a joy for all!

This program will match kid writer/actors with adult writer/actors and charge them with writing a play together to perform together. On a PlayBack weekend, a team will go away and having decided on two characters and a situation, the kid will write the first act of a two-act play. The adult will then take this play and write act two, "sometime later. . ." in time. When we have an evening-ful of plays, we will schedule public performances under the collective title (you guessed it!) "Sometime Later. . ." PlayBack is the natural union of the One-on-Ones and Playmaking and gives some of our veterans a new challenge.

## Replication

This past summer, Tom Carey, successfully "replicated" the Project's One-on-One program in the Bushwick section of Brooklyn by taking seven kids and seven performance artists away to Long Island where they worked on plays with the theme, "Heroic Times". It gives all of us at the Project extreme pleasure to know that our ideas, methods and experiences can be used to help start similar programs in other neighborhoods and communities. It also comes at an extremely fortuitous time as we are both raising money to better prepare ourselves for replication, as well as answering questions from people around the country (Atlanta, Macon, Sarasota, Trenton, Los Angeles, etc.) who have heard about the Project and want to start their own.
