Follow The Leader Follow Up

Eight new writers (aged 8 - 12) premiered their plays about what it's like to be a leader, or to be pushed around by one. Strangely, three of the plays were show biz stories (that's where most of the pushing around occurred). The Follow The Leader kids were Gemma Cooper-Novack, Nyita Hanley, Rachel James, Habiba and Rashida Koroma, Annette Myrie, Andre Parks, and Fernando Ramirez. In December the eight writers went with their eight dramaturg/directors to stay at the homes of Wendy Ettinger, Barbara Ettinger and Jack Gilpin & Ann McDonough. There, the kids spent the days working on their plays, and songs (!). One afternoon we took the kids to Western Riding Stables where they got to ride horses. All the kids got a real kick out of the trail ride, but Nyita complained that it smelled too much like "maneuver."

Replay, Replay, Replay




Project Dirt
