## PLAYMAKING



We spent a smashing 3-day weekend at the 3 homes of Maria Tucci, Frances McDormand, and Wendy Ettinger doing 3 things: rehearsing, rehearsing, and re-

hearsing. Then, armed with great plays and songs, we broke into the West Bank Cafe, loaded up the bar with Birch Beer Floats (courtesy of Boylan's Bottling Company and D'Agostino's Supermarkets, Inc.) and had a rollicking two days of performances. The title and theme of the show was Breaking the Mold II, and there was a whole lotta breakin' goin' on.

Ray Ocasio and Sahara Walsh performed a retelling of Jane Eyre in "Johnny Eyreco" (written by Gina Torres and directed by Stephen Haff). Janice Santiago was a very modern handmaiden and Judy Agosto her old-fashioned princess in the hard hitting and feminist "Don't Bet on the Prince" (written by Adrienne Shelly, directed by Kirsten Sanderson) with a comedic cameo by Jonathan Santiago as Prince Dweeb. Yull Neri-Borda and Tessa John-Connor were "Chained for Life" as fugitives from a chain gang in a play written by Michael Bernard and directed by Dion Graham. José Dominguez directed Liz Tucillo's "Perfect Imperfection" which featured Ben Barthelemy as the imperfect child and Corrinda Smith as the scientist who must learn to love him. Robert Shaffron wrote, John Steber directed, and Jonsi Smith and Deshana Hamid starred in "Women on the Verge," a searing play about crimes of fashion. Thomas Santoni finally found a role he was born to play: God in José Rivera's "God Stuff" (directed by Gus Rogerson). The play also featured Ahmed Attia showing off his range by playing a rabbit, a wolf, and the First Man. All the music was composed by newcomer Kim Sherman who did a swell job and backed up the kid's pipes with mellifluous tones all evening. Phew! A lotta people, a lotta Birch Beer and two great nights of theater.



## SALLY NEEDS A PLACE!




