
kids in our January production, The

Our fall playmaking class concluded with nine new works written on the theme "Wild Life: The Uninhibited Plays," and performed in December at Primary Stages.

Ali Marsh and William Christian learned how warm an igloo really can be in Charina Corbett's Cheetah and Bear.

In Yazzy Troche's I Want Those Sneakers a little girl (Laura Jean Smith) discovered what happens when you steal money from a father (Alex Draper). Animals were at odds once again in Isaac Trujillo's The Cat That Taught the Dog and the Dog That Taught the Cat with Yusef Bulos and Kaleda Davis. Patricia Triana and Sharon Washington faced the spirit of a young girl's father (played with enormous dignity and power by Arthur French) in The Friendly Ghost by Zaida Natera.

In Mark and Ashley's Christmas, by Joel Lind, an unemployed grizzly (Frank Wood) and his adopted polar bear sister (Nancy O'Connor) found the true spirit of gift-giving. Finally, in All About Shopping, by Lorraine Calderon, a daughter (Lisa Benavides) comes to grips with her parents' broken marriage after meeting a great many people and a talking Barbie doll, all played by Dana Ivey.

Our nascent playwrights were assisted by the following dramaturgs and directors: Josh Astrachan, Michael Bernard, Julie Boyd, Jose Dominguez, Willy Holtzman, Suzen Murakoshi, Willie Reale, Robert Shaffron, John Steber, and Max Wilk. We also thank Tom Carozza for portraying two rather unusual salesmen.

The whole magilla was paid for by the Jonathan Larson Foundation for the Performing Arts We received the first-ever grant from this foundation and the kids did 'em proud.


WE'VE GOT A WEB SITE

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


