nce again, the Project summer revolved around the twin-barreled One-on-Ones. These are the shows that pair up one kid with one adult in a play written (usually) by the adult partner. This year's theme was **One Slight Hitch: The Caveat Plays**. For our July set, we boarded the ferry for Block Island, R.I. where we roomed, boarded, boogie-boarded, and cavorted with 10 kids and their partners for a week. Immediately upon returning to America, we presented the shows at the magnanimous **Ensemble Studio Theater**. What, you missed it? Okay, here's what happened.

The opening play, What An Angel, had Cupid, the young Roman god of love (Peter Granados, 10) switching mythologies and being promoted to the rank of guardian angel. Gus Rogerson, who wrote and directed, played the Archangel Gabriel while junior counselor Jed Clarke rendered a laid-back Lucifer. Mona Lisa Barthelemy, 11, was Shiver, a stylish penguin who convinces her formal igloo-mate Chatter (Alison Eikerenkoetter) to dress a little more "kazh" in Donald Rothschild's A Penguin's Tale. Jacquelyn Reingold

wrote and directed *Alone At Last,* in which **Christina Ramirez**, 11, portrayed a petulant princess who commands her wizard (**Ali Marsh**) to turn her family into barnyard animals and household objects.

Willie Reale's Present Lives saw Lorraine Zambrano, 13, and Anne Torsiglieri crossing the River of Forgetfulness to procure a nugget of Infinite Wisdom. In Phil, written and directed by Michael Bernard, Isaac Trujillo, 11, fought his criminal nemesis (Michael, of course) with poetry and got the girl (junior counselor Annette Myrie) in the bargain. Jayme Rosado, 11, and Jose Soto found out what it's like to go nose to bill with the ducks you're hunting in Tim Nelson's Beasley. Vionel Ortiz, 13, and Wendy vanden Heuvel slung jibes and pierogies in Cindy Caponera's Little Poland.

In **George Babiak's** Remoral Dilemma, a scavenger fish (George) attempted to persuade a young Great White Shark (**Michael Feliciano**, 10) how cool it really is to be a carnivore. **Russ Lees**' The Great Explorer took us back to the Age of Discovery to chart the relationship between an ambitious captain (**Candy Godoy**, 13) and her bumbling first mate (**Tanya Gingerich**). The evening ended with yet another play by the prolific Willie: Condimentally Yours. **Chanel Christiansen**, 11, and **Cecilia Arana** were rival princesses who wage war over how hot dogs should be garnished. They are now both seasoned actresses (heh-heh).

The Block Island production would not have been possible without the generosity and help of **Christina Biaggi, Pat Walsh** (not to mention twins **Noah** and **Aidan**), **Joya Verde** and **Virginia Dare**, and our wonderful chefs **Pat McQuade** and **Martha Velie-Gass.**

In August, we hitched up the wagon trains to 11 kid/adult teams and trekked out west to the green hills of Tyler Hill, Pennsylvania, where we spent a week with our excellent hosts, artists **Mike Sell** and **Eric Karpeles**. More rehearsing, more eating, but the boogie-boarding was replaced by a series of newly invented and patently absurd water games like the Please-and-Thank-You Relay Race.

As for the show, the evening was kicked off by Liz Tuccillo's Roommate Wanted, in which Jaysunn Rosado, 13, sought an affordable apartment share in New York City. The best he could do was Wendy vanden Heuvel's closet at \$800 a month. Jennifer Jimenez, 11, learned the true value of Beanie Babies and friendship from her stuffed bear Denise Burse in Diana Son's Singing Out. Cute little bunny Matthew Jellison, 12, on the other hand, employed the old friendship scam

to get out of being eaten by omnivorous Frenchman Michael Potts in The Life and Near Mort of Happy Lapin by Cindy Lou Johnson. Thom Babe's Ticket to Ride explored 12-year old Yazzy Troche's dream of going to Hawaii and asked the audience to choose between her friendship (with Jane Bodle) and the vacation of a lifetime.

Willy Holtzman's Liberty 2 pitted New York and New Jersey against one another in a bitter dispute between rival Statues of Liberty. Zaida Natera, 11, and Kelly Taffe played the giant monuments while George Babiak simply directed. In Joe Bob and the Bull Frog, by David Schwab, Michael

Castro, 14, played an arrogant rodeo cowboy who gets his comeuppance from an ornery frog, wartily played by Peter Jay Fernandez. The award for most original use of the show's theme goes to everyone's favorite criminal nemesis, Michael Bernard, who wrote and directed *One Slight Hitchhiker* for Mayleen Cancel, 13, and Jane Bodle. In it, a deranged (yet appealing) hitchhiker changes the life of a troubled motorist for the better.

In what has become an annual ritual, **Jerry McGill** returned from Oregon to script a show. This year's offering, *The Dons*, had Jerry showing the greatest (but least educated) swordfighter in Mexico (**Peter Ventura**, 13) that if you study hard you can win big cash prizes on a TV game show hosted by Pat Sajak (**Ray Ocasio**). Lessons abounded in this production. In **Adrienne Shelly's** *About Face*, gorgeous Dr. Love (**Isha Rodriguez**, 13) taught the breathtakingly beautiful **Eris Migliorini** that pretty girls don't have to be miserable. In **Adam Felber's** *What Our Dead Daddy's Deed Done Did*, the evening's only antebellum epic, **Aisha Jabour**, 12, and Adam saved their plantation from the clutches of an unscrupulous Yankee creditor (**Thom Babe**).

The last show of the summer was **Willie Reale's** *Winging Away (A Thinly-Veiled Metaphor).* Some of you

may still be trying to figure out what metaphor Willie was veiling with his play about an angel-wing repairman (Willie) who must tell a youthful client (Jonathan Villanueva, 12) that he is leaving his noble profession. Well, folks, it was actually about Willie himself, who selfishly used poor Jonathan to gain some closure. The Project staff is exploring ways of making things up to this fine youngster.


