Each Project teen was challenged to write a scene in which a specific sonnet appeared. The new material was designed to illuminate what the teen felt the sonnet meant. Then they were all cast in each other's scenes and the whole extravaganza was performed at **INTAR's** fancy new theater 'round the corner on 53rd Street. Thank you, INTAR!

Natasha Soto played a woman who had had enough of her two-timing fiancé in No Longer Your Servant. Jennifer Soccaras delved into the difficulties of long-distance relationships in Star Light, Star Bright. Zsuzsa Mysak cast herself as the Reverend Jackie: pastor, advice-giver and New Age author in To Marry or Not to Marry. Just in case you didn't know, Eddie Zambrano reminded us that Men Are Dogs, Women Are Dogs, Too. Annette Myrie examined the trials and tribulations of falling in love with a close friend in Sum it Up. Ray Harold showed us just how bad things have to get before they start looking up in The Good Day. Ray Ocasio portrayed a man who makes the ultimate sacrifice in The Things You Do For Love. In Jed Clarke's Jesus' Press Conference the Son of God returns only to find the media is more concerned with his social calendar than his message of Armageddon. In the end, he is reduced to defending the attractiveness of his girlfriend.



Have you ever wondered what goes on behind the scenes at a World Series? Well, **Steve Bula** answered that question for us in the aptly titled *World Series*. So, for this year's Project benefit, *Everyone's A Comedian*, held at the Puck Building on Monday, May 3, 1999, we returned to the good old days of comedy. We plumbed the depths of material from the golden days of vaudeville—because stealing other people's

gags is far easier than coming up with original jokes.

Over 500 guests were transported, through the magic of theater (or at least through a corny conceit in the script by **Willie Reale, Michael Bernard, Lewis Black** and **Becky Browder**) to Jumbasa's-by-the-Lake, a once-plush Catskills resort, gone to seed. The resort's impresario, Morton Bezzler, hilariously played by **Oliver Platt**, gripes about the bygone days when Jumbasa's was the keen place. His assistant, Goldie, played by **Lorraine Zambrano**, hits upon the idea of finding a new act to pump up business.

Into Mr. Bezzler's office troops a parade of comic acts: Vionel Ortiz and Fisher Stevens played a very "Burns and Allen" pair; Jayme Rosado was a Groucho-like doctor to Roma Maffia's rather Margaret Dumont-ish patient; Jaymaree Rosado threw her Edgar Bergen-y voice into Lewis Black's Charlie McCarthy-esque dummy; and Peter Granados and Mary Testa played an old fashioned song and kazoo team who belted a rousing rendition of "We Carry a *Torch for the Borscht Belt"* (music by **Henry Krieger**, lyrics by Mr. Reale.) All of these acts were interrupted by the silent duo of Jonathan Torres (seen on p. 4) and Adrian Zambrano (seen in the photo above), a couple of clowns who think a quick game of bingo might save the day. Miss Catskills Bingo 1999 Gina Torres, made a special appearance to call the numbers. The guests all played with gusto, never suspecting the whole thing was rigged until everyone shouted "Bingo!" in unison.

All of this hilarity was directed by **Mark Linn-Baker**, on a humorous set designed by **Kevin Roach**, under **Greg MacPherson's** droll lighting, while **Tom Morse's** witty sound design made certain every word was heard. **Crystal Thompson** designed the (intentionally) funny-looking clothes.

The food was New York Deli style, served by the **Wash-ington Street Caterers'** wait staff in Groucho glasses.

The Dark Side Of The Project


