We accomplished this amazing dual feat by taking ten kids, matching them up with some volunteer adult mentors, and then taking the whole band to **Block Island, R.I.** to rehearse plays that the grown-ups had written. Then we brought

the finely honed pieces back to the **Ensemble Stu- dio Theatre** in N.Y.C. for a four-night Off-Off
Broadway run. That, in a nutshell, is how our
annual One-on-One shows work, but we
need more than a nutshell to review this particular extravaganza...

Lightning Strikes Twice: The Highly Unlikely Plays (for that is what the evening was entitled) fittingly began with a play about Early Man. In New Neighbor, Peter Granados, 11, played a charming caveman named Ned Anderthal who tries to engage a larger, more guttural troglodyte (actor/ writer/balladeer Josh Lewis) in a civilized conversation. Laurence Klavan's Pet Sounds had friendly puppy Zaida Natera, 12, convincing paranoid cyclist Chris McCann that all she wanted to do was chat. In Let Us Eat Cake, by Ashby Semple, Jennifer Jimenez, 12, portrayed a very snotty queen who gets her come-uppance from the local weather wizard (Ashby).

Felicita Jerez, 13, was *Mall Girl*, the superpowered avenger of shoppers everywhere in **Jacquelyn Reingold**'s play of the same name.

In this play **Keira Naughton** played Pearl, best described as a female version of Alfred the Butler. **Johnathan Roldan** lived out every 12 year-old boy's fantasy of being a debonair jewel thief who terrorizes the Riviera in **George Babiak's** *The Slippery Eel* (okay, so it's a 43 year-old man's fantasy. So what?). George played Johnathan's pea-brained accomplice, Dumbley, while **John Sheehy** turned in another masterful cameo as the simpering, wealthy miser J. Wellington Piccadilly.

Anju Andre-Bergmann, 12, and **Matt Saldivar** were inmates in a sanitarium who plan a crime-fighting career as Crazy Lady and her sidekick Jiggly Man in the aptly titled *Mental Patient*. It was a great play, but Project insiders are a

bit concerned about the psychological state of author **Michael Bernard**. In *Phineas' Waterloo*, by **Susan Kim**, **Steven Vasquez**, 12, frightened his brother (**Joe Quintero**) by pretending to be the ghost of Napoleon. By all accounts, Steve's French accent was impeccable. **Marlene Moran**, 13, was a belligerent alley cat who reluctantly seeks the counsel of Doctor **Robert Sean Leonard** in *It Takes Two*, which happened to be Mr. Leonard's stellar writing debut at the Project.

Having been in the job for six months, our not-so-new artistic director **Gus Rogerson** decided that it was time to bring his darkest imaginings to the stage in *Flora's Story*. **Anissa Albarron**, 13, played a young medieval girl imprisoned for the crime of reading. Her cell-mate: a human ear that fell off a leper and grew to immense proportions.

The giant auricle was played by Gus's wife **Robin Morse**. **Keira Naughton** gets an extra mention for taking over during a couple of performances when the ear lost its voice.

The night ended with good old reliable Willie Reale's Short John Copper, which is the first Project show to have a two-city premiere (it was also done in the Williamstown Theater Festival's Project replication this summer). Adrian Zambrano, 10, was a small but crusty pirate captain whose heart and other assorted vital organs are restored by a winsome waitress named Brandy ("she's a fine girl") who was perfectly played by Patrice Johnson.

The shows were packed with music (no less than 15 original songs) which was skillfully and swiftly provided by composer **Kirsten Childs** and pianist

Virginia Pike.

Is that everyone? Nope! **Shirley Rumierk** (our emergency intern) and **Tessa John-Connor** (our Junior Counselor) made many sandwiches and filled in as dinosaurs, royal seamstresses, witless shoppers, cops, and malevolent nurses.

If not for some notable Block Island buddies we'd have had to sleep on the beach and eat the sand which is there (say that last phrase fast and you'll get it). Christina Biaggi, Pat Walsh, Virginia Dare, Joya Verde, Rita and Steve Draper, Sarah Barkley, Toube and Bennet Wohl, and Elliott and Jennifer Taubman provided housing for us while Martha Velie-Gass, Pat McQuade, and our special guest chef Chip Frye whipped up some truly fine grub.

After a crazy week of rehearsing and swimming and inventing the wonderful pool activity known as *Tsunami*, we came back to town to show off the fruits of our labors.

Among the highlights of the evening were: **Joshua Brown**, 11, as agent Neville Slate, a rapping super suave spy

in Tomorrow Never Quacks. His evilnemesis-turned-food server-turned-evil-nemesis Dr. Ernst von Hägen Däz was played by Adam Felber. How does a bolt of lightning feel about the damage he causes when hitting people? We found

out the answer to that question in *Chloe and Ziggy Tackle the Big Questions* by **Liz Tuccillo** starring **Isaac Trujillo**, 12, as Ziggy the lightning bolt and **Annie Torsiglieri** as Chloe the cloud.

In *The Incredibly Strange But Incredibly True Case of the Missing Kawinky-Dinkies* by **Neena Beber**, **Alejandra Rodriguez**, 12, and **Camilia Sanes** portrayed a scientist studying coincidences and a woman who never experiences any – who would believe they find out that they are related! What a Kawinky-Dinky! **Mona-Lisa Barthelemy**, 12, was *Nikki Spillane: Hardboiled Gumshoe with a Heart of Gold* by the one and only **Robert Shaffron**. **John Steber** was the aptly named Johnny, who plotted his secret revenge against Nikki. Luckily, she figured out the scam and before you could say "film-noir cliché" the jig was up. Gone from the Project but not forgotten, **Willie Reale** penned the story of two downon-their-luck brother prospectors known as *The Brothers Mendoza* for **Justin Aponte**, 11, and **Ed Vassallo**.
