

Okay, Now It's Our Move



Well, it's March, which means that it's time for our annual blockbuster issue of Project Update: six giant pages, but still not quite enough to distill the events that have transpired since our last ish in November. It hasn't been that long, but we've done a lot of stuff, beginning with *It's Your Move: The Strategic Plays*, the 1999 edition of our Playback program.

Playback is probably the most complicated of all our programs, but here's the basic structure: 1. Seven kids go out to **Wareham, Massachusetts** over Columbus Day weekend to write plays for themselves and their adult partners to appear in. 2. A week later, the adult partners turn in "answer plays" that usually employ the same settings and characters the kids used. 3. The kids and adults rehearse their shows and then present the pairs of plays onstage back to back. Get it? Great! Here's what happened this time.

Candy Godoy opened the show with *The Pigeon Decision*, an in-depth examination of the little-known society that inhabits the ledges and window sills of our city. Candy and **Jose Soto** played two pigeons that clash and are later baked alive in a pie in **Jackie Reingold's** sequel, *Coo-Dependency*. In his action-packed adventure, *A Day In The Life of An Agent*, **Hakim Latimore** took on a French master villain (**George Babiak**) who happened to be an enormous wedge of cheese. Cheeseman got creamed in **Suzen Murakoshi's** *Afraid 2....*

Tanika Parson and Tanya Gingerich explored the ugly side of sibling rivalry in Tanika's play *Stepsisters* while Jonathan Bernstein's *Maria, Susan, and Jessica Say Grace* brought peace to the household and broke new ground by avoiding dialogue entirely. A Project play in dance! The evergraceful Denise Burse played the Mom in both plays. We returned to more traditional material with *Wacky Burger*, in which Marcsi Mysak created for herself the part of a wisecracking white mouse who gnaws at the self-esteem of counterman Robert Sean Leonard. Bob followed up by writing himself a breathtaking dual role as the burger vendor AND his dad in Wacky Burger II.

Act II began with **Noel Polanco's** *The Most Interesting Day*, in which he played a doctor whose sole dream is to be the "best singer in the biz." Exactly which biz is never stated, but **Gus Rogerson's** *Surgeons* answered many other questions and supplied us with the best show-within-a-show ever seen on a Project stage. Up next was **Osage Lewis-Ashley's**

eerie *Masters* and its equally unearthly second installment: **Keith Reddin's** *Masters II: The Revenge of the Begonians.* Osage and **Danyon Davis** played two young kung fu masters in the year 3000 who battle an entire alien race ruled by the one with the biggest head (Keith Reddin, whose head isn't really that big).

The evening ended on a serious note with *Sisters Make a Move* by **Jaya Rosado** and **Adriana Trigiani's** response *Sisters Tell the Truth.* Jaya and **Jeanne Simpson** played two sisters who are forced to deal with an abusive father (**Michael Bernard**).



On hand for small but impressive roles in the shows were our versatile intern **Ariel Aver**, the remarkable **Jonathan Goldblatt**, the mysterious **Zsuzsa Mysak**, and the mercurial **John Sheehy**. A strategically placed "thank you" goes to **Rusty Magee** for the music, to the **Randolph** family for putting us up, and to **Christopher** for cooking. *GB*

I'LL HAVE A SLICE OF THAT

Gus Rogerson, our illustrious Artistic Director, was convinced that our December round of Playmaking plays should somehow celebrate the hopeful dawn of a new century without actually mentioning the words "millennium," "Y2K" or

"apocalypse." Banned, too, were "Happy," "New," and "Year." Faced with this quandary, Gus slowly consumed a large portion of peach cobbler and stared into the heavens for some time. It wasn't long before he conceived the theme *Pie In The Sky: The Possibility Plays.* Honestly, we don't know how he does it.



Opening the evening of kid-written/adult-acted plays at the Ensemble Studio Theatre was Ivana Lugo's Bully, which had nothing to do with Teddy Roosevelt but told the story of a schoolyard oppressor (L. Trey Wilson) who gets his come-uppance from a spunky classmate (Nedra Gallegos) and her foul-tempered dog (Jonathan Goldblatt). Bad Good Luck Coins by Giovanna Mendez featured an ill-starred young girl (Liliana Amador) whose blind friend (Paul Butler) guides her to better fortunes. In Jonathan Hagemeyer's Bob, The Hero of the Day, a landlubbing fish

(Buzz Bovshow) conquers his overpowering b.o. and befriends the town bully (Jack Gwaltney) of Tyler Hill where, coincidentally, all the plays were written.

Adalberto Rodriguez wrote of a man named Cowboy Dog (Ray Anthony Thomas) who gets some valuable tips on real estate from a friendly fruit salesman (Tom Carrozza) in The One Who Slept In The Doghouse.

Act I ended with the epic of the evening: Frankie Ventura's Underwearman and

Kathy Get Married and Underwearman Wins. The play centered around a champion wrestler (Angel David) who defeats one opponent after another by using a deadly wedgie maneuver. He is undone by a winsome, but vengeful lady wrestler (Catherine Mueller) who thoroughly trounces both U-Man and his mom (Anne Torsiglieri).

Act II brought us *Alice and Ida*, by **Amelia Whitney**, which told the tale of a simple country girl (Angelina Phillips), her urbane mom (Messeret Stroman) and their conflict over where to live. In what is becoming an honored tradition, George Babiak became the most recent in a long line of male actors to don the Project cow suit. Marilyn Sanchez's Change of Life brought us a French girl (Angelina Fiordellisi) and a Jamaican young woman (Myra Lucretia **Taylor**) who discover that visiting one another in person is not quite as simple as entering an on-line chatroom.

Gus Rogerson had every kid in the house trembling with his portrayal of "the meanest principal in town" in Jason **Bula's** dark character study *Dealing With The Principal.* **Alex Draper** and **Anna Li** played two students who exact a brutal revenge on the hapless educator. **Johnathan Ladines**' *The* Weird Battle between Space Weirdo and Mr. Hunter may be a long title, but it saves us column space by being a synopsis as well. Jenny Pollack, in a role she shared with an enormous fake beard, was the eponymous Mr. Hunter while Yul Vasquez was Space Weirdo, a name that needs no explanation.

Bringing a recurring theme of the evening to a close, Nerds Strike Back, by Oscar Padilla, featured another revenge against a bully, but this time with magic. Billy Crudup got even with Florencia **Lozano** through the use of a spell that turned her into first a rock, then a chocolate nut brownie, and finally and fittingly, a bespectacled nerd.

Pie In The Sky could not have been baked to a crispy

Vitucci, Cecilia Arana, Greg Allen, Jyllian Gunther, Michael Bernard, Kate Ryan, Melissa Murray, Josh Lewis, David Schwab, and Tom Schall. These hardy souls traveled with us to our kid-writer's retreat in Pennsylvania at the beautiful home of our generous friends Mike Sell and Eric Karpeles. We're also grateful to Rusty Magee for supplying some wonderful music to go with our kids' lyrics.

Tom Schall? Well, he gets his name mentioned a second time in this piece simply because he always shows up for load-in and light hang.

Miffed because you missed this great show? Fear not! The next Playmaking show is taking place this very month! I'm referring, of course, to Follow Your Nose: Plays of Instinct, which will take place on March 24-26 at the sumptuous Peter Norton Space (a.k.a. The Signature Theater Company). 
The long journey from Thick to Thin began with **Tim Blake Nelson's** epic ode to, well, bums: The Northern

Line. The bums were wonderfully played by Isaac Trujillo and Aisha Jabour, while Noel Polanco scared us silly with his vicious rendering of a psychopathic yard bull. Director **Eris Migliorini** heaped on lots of great schtick. Next up was The Mirror, by **Tim** and **Michelle Meadows** (the Project's own Stiller and Meara, except they have the same last name), with Jonathan Villanueva and Alejandra Rodriguez getting lots of laughs as the most clueless dad ever and his very tolerant daughter. The Mirror Dancers were led by **Jumpin**' Jed Clarke, among others. Liz Tuccillo was the brilliant and faithful helmswoman. The first act curtain call came down on Regina Porter's Speak Up, written for Vionel Ortiz and Mayleen Cancel and directed splendidly by Anne **Torsiglieri**. Both girls shone in a dream play set in a psychic South Pole. As always, **Carol Ochs** was the voice of Truth.

The happy patrons floated back in from intermission sated with floats provided by Mary Moore and D'Agostino Supermarkets (vanilla ice cream) and Ron Fiorina and Boylan's Soda (root beer!). Wrist action came from a bunch of fine guest scoopers, led by the proprietor of Ray's Root Beer Oasis, the Project's own Ray Ocasio.

First off in the second act was **Susan Kim's** *She's Da Bomb*. Zabryna Guevara's in-spy-ring guidance of Zaida Natera and Yazzy Troche as two sleuths in a spy ring (yeah, baby!) was a delight to behold, as was Johnathan Roldan's scenestealing turn as the infamous Molasses Pirelli. They were followed by **Jayme Rosado** as a rodent with a wooden stick, or a "rat with a bat" and Christina Ramirez as a human with no talent, or "author Judy Hack," in Mo Rocca's Unexpected *Tail.* They were guided to glory by funnyman **Adam Felber**. The closer was a Willie Reale special, The Blue Carlotta. Matthew Jellison and Joel Lind brought down the house as two dashing chaps named Quimby and Rumbleton who do battle with an unseen enemy on a giant existential game board. I can't remember who directed that one.

Patrick Barnes tickled the ivories and wrote some amazing music. Shouts of thanks to our weekend hosts Maria Tucci, Wendy Ettinger, Derek McLane, Fran McDormand and Joel Coen. Daniel Swee made all the meals; if the show hadn't been so damn good, we'd all still be talking about nothing but the four different types of mouth-watering meatloaf (sorry, Willie) on Saturday night or the pear and apple tarts...which left us more thick than thin. Project Invades U.K.

Kate Coleman, the artistic director of the Project replication in London, England, was in town recently and stopped by the clubhouse to chat about how things have been going across the pond.

The fledgling company called Scene and Heard serves a low-income area known as Somerstown. started out as an Irish neighborhood at the turn of the century," Kate says, "and now we have Bangladeshi, Somalians, Kosovans,

Turkish, and a lot of Afro-English, too. It's very multi-ethnic. One of the schools we work with has 30 languages spo-

Scene and Heard was founded in January, 1999 by Kate and her friend, Sophie Boyack. Though the pair work parttime and have only one year under their belts, they've racked up three Playmaking shows (the first one was themed In At The Deep End) and are working on their first Replay class, which will mark their first show in a real theater (their performances thus far have all been in community halls). They are planning to have their first One-on-One in the summer of 2001.

Just as in New York, the work of Scene and Heard would be impossible without the support of local institutions and the help of London's artistic community. Office space is donated by St. Mary's, a local church, and time and talent are provided by a host of actors and directors. "We started with a bunch of friends, then moved on to friends of friends. Our last show was the first one in which we worked with people we didn't know earlier." Scene and Heard is making friends in high places as well. Emily Watson, now visible in U.S. theaters as Frank McCourt's mom in Angela's Ashes, has become a patron and is spreading the word about the company whenever she gets the ear of the press.

Kate and Sophie are adept fund-raisers. "We started off by literally writing a letter to every single person we knew and inviting them to be 'Eyes and Ears.' They wrote checks and the first term was entirely funded by that money. Since then we've gotten money from government and from trusts." The annual budget is currently about £25,000.

Kate is not exactly a newcomer to her work. Most of her professional life has been in directing and theater-in-education ("I worked briefly as an actor before I realized that wasn't my forte."). She knows our city well, having spent two years here teaching Shakespeare in public high schools with the Lark Theater Company. Her art college background has also made Kate Scene and Heard's chief foam-core prop maker.

We marveled at how boldly Scene and Heard has plunged into its work in the past year. Kate had a quick answer: "Well, one of the nice things is that we knew the formula worked. We trusted the formula, and as long as we trusted it, we knew something was going to come out at the end. Thank goodness you guys did the work for us before we started!"

Well, all we can say to that is thank goodness the children of London have a Kate Coleman! GB


