Puns in the Oven: Plays on Words, opened with Josh Lewis' Betty Bold and the Cootie Caper, wherein Ani Kehr (as the tough-as-nails title character) struck at playground bullies everywhere. Next up, The Joke's On You, by Priya Ayyar, had Suzette Santana teaching a clueless comedienne (Priva) the ropes - complete with a trip into fairy-tale land. Then came Jasmine of the Squares (written and directed by Kim Sykes), wherein young math whiz Ariana Casablanca faced down an evil soap opera star (Kim). In Witches (written and directed by Megan Sandberg-Zakian), Britney Castro and Zabryna Guevara fled from an angry mob played by our backstage crew of Project vets (Mayleen Cancel, Noel Polanco, and Mary Vamvoukakis) and then discovered that everyone can, and should, be a witch. Despite the occasional aroma of wist in the air, kids and adults succeeded in generating a light-hearted crop of shows. The production at EST was kicked off by Marilyn Sanchez as a disenchanted cod and Lisa Leguillou as an unscrupulous starfish in Jackie Reingold's A Cod Piece. Their show featured a special appearance by **Mike Sell** as a "Mussel Man." It was very finny, er, funny.

Gus Rogerson's End Of The Line cast Anthony Mejia as a hapless mechanic who owns a garage in the middle of nowhere. Catherine Mueller was his fairy godmother and first and only customer. Matt Saldívar took us way into the desert with Showdown In Sevilla for Berto Rodriquez, who played a tiny Mexican town's sheriff, barber, butcher, and choir director while Matt was his sidekick.

In One Tough Cookie Crumbles, by John Sheehy, Lizette **Natera** was a junior chef at Madame Borgia's Evil Genius Bakery (Denise Burse was the culinary saboteur). Dan Berrett's Bolt saw Stephen Galimidi and Michael Potts as a disgruntled racehorse and his craggy trainer. The audience was nuts about *Bolt*, and galloped out for the intermission to strap on feedbags filled with Flyer bars.

The second act was brought back by Jonathan Hagemeyer and Ed Vassallo in Tim Nelson's A Shaggy Fly Story about a couple of hicks who slaughter a fly with a shotgun and are tried by an insect judge (Peter Jay Fernandez). Next up was Adam Felber's Slashdance, which featured Ivana Granados and Jeanne Simpson as a pair of dancers menaced by a killer cactus (thorny John, Sheehy). Willie Reale's Mellow Drama had Leah Galimidi as a weeping widow and Peter Jay Fernandez as both her evil landlord and her asthmatic artist son.

No show is complete without two baking plays, so Annie Torsiglieri furnished us with Taking the Cake. Annie was a nasty (but fetching) queen who learned a valuable lesson from cupcake chef Wendy Rivera. The show closed with Michael Bernard and Justin Aponte in Conjoined Twin Prison Break. Michael refused to tell us what the show was about, so you'll just have to imagine it.

Kim Sherman again penned our songs, this time assisted by David Gaines, who taught the tunes to the kids and played during the shows. Elissa Errick was our steadfast stage manager while all-purpose intern Sarah Petersiel joined us again. Proj Kids Go Into Politics

On September 19, I went with Osage Lewis and Candy Godoy to Community Board Four's Introductory Youth Committee meeting. Osage and Candy were invited to the meeting as teen representatives of the Chelsea and Clinton neighborhoods. They were the only kids to show up, but in light of the city's recent tragedy, the low attendance made sense.

Everyone wanted to know exactly what was important to high schoolers living in Manhattan. Both talked about the importance of safety in Clinton (ahem ... Hell's Kitchen), where they live, and in Chelsea, where Candy attends high school. Osage mentioned rivalries between groups within the neighborhoods and Candy wondered if the streets in her neighborhood could be better lit at night. The two also discussed the availability of after-school programs for all Manhattan's youth.

At the end of the meeting, Candy asked Lynn Chaleff, the Youth Advisory Board chair, what kind of power the Community Board would have in realizing their suggestions. Perhaps fearing that Candy was already intoxicated by potential power, Lynn explained that each teen representative's role was merely an advisory one. Candy surprised Lynn by asking, "No, I mean, what kind of power do you have?" With that, it was final. Because of their honesty, maturity and enthusiasm, Osage and Candy were offered two elite positions on the Youth Advisory Council of Community Board Four as well as on the Borough President's Youth Advisory Council.
