


FIGHT SONG

Nobody gets down to brass tacks better than the 10 brand new playwrights who brought us this winter's Playmaking show, *Heart of the Matter: Basically Ten Plays*, a rip-roaring evening that featured 10 fights and 10 songs.

The evening's first bout was between classmates (She's No) Angel Desai and Rebecca (not of Sunnybrook Farm) White in Tiffany Paget's Emotions. Their closing duet, Be Friends Forever, left little doubt as to the outcome. Think penguins are cute and cuddly? Joshua Omana proved otherwise with his hard-hitting melodrama, Reddy's Evil Plan. Jonathan Goldblatt and Dale Ho both looked real nice in their bird get-ups. The same cannot be said for Karen Trott, a chick who didn't know how to dress California-cool in Jazzlyn Hernandez' On and Off. Kaitlyn Kenney played a Left Coaster who set her straight. Anna Li gave us a world class figure skater/pro football coach to Jay Patterson's world class dork/pro football player, and crew kid Joel Lind provided the fisticuffs in John Cuevas' A Football Player's Dream. Chassity Damiani closed the first act with the epic battle of Cloudman and Sun vs. Meltman. The title characters, played by John Sheehy, Femi Plimpton and Alex Draper, fittingly chose companionship over global catastrophe.

Caroline Rodriguez' The Fight Between Friends blended fighting, singing, basketball and tap dancing in the story of two contentious pals brought to life by Project vet Kevin Geer and Project alum Shirley Rumierk. The penultimate play had Duane Boutté and David Grillo as the Project's answer to Madison and Unger, in Eddie Cuevas' Let Me Stay.

The donnybrooks and ditties came to an end with *The Parrot and the Old House,* by **Christian Alvarez**, about a diseased misanthrope (**P.J. Brown**) who learns to love his singing parrot (**Maddie Corman**).

Each kid had a top-drawer director/dramaturg in his/her corner. We're sure they join us in giving big ups to Joe White, Peter Herdrich, Marcella André, Connie Grappo, Liliana Amador, Elizabeth Giamatti, Danny Goldstein and Jace Alexander. The same goes for our weekend hosts Cathy and Stephen Graham, Lynn and Sam Waterston and Liz and Paul Giamatti. We must also pay tribute to Karen Munkel, our stage manager, and Crystal Thompson, our costume designer. And although he refused to have anything to do with all the roughhousing, our ever-lovin' composer Rusty Magee made every one of the ten songs a charttopper. Thanks Rusty.



DISCO BASH A BALL

Back when the Project began, the sun was beginning to set on the Disco era, but the Project resurrected all of the glamour and gaudiness of the days of "Boom, Boom, Boom" one last time on Monday, May 13, 2002 at STILL STAYIN' ALIVE, the Twentieth Anniversary Disco Bash.

The Eyebeam Atelier was awash in mirror balls and colored lights. In keeping with the dance club theme, Ronnie Davis of Great Performances festooned the tables in Mylar and devised the family-style menu. John Laird of Diageo Chateau & Estate Wines provided the accompanying fermented grape extract.

Over 500 guests tapped their toes as **Paul Dixon**, Stephen Galimidi and Suzette Santana performed the Hustle by way of introducing emcee Lewis Black. Kate Burton and Billy Crudup joined in to present a short film retrospective of the Project's first twenty years which was directed by Noël Dawkins and Wendy Ettinger, edited by Tricia Cooke and mixed by Margaret Crimmins. The show was written by Willie Reale and John Sheehy, directed by Jonathan Bernstein, and choreographed by **Jeanne Simpson**. The set and rigging was designed by Kevin Roach, the mammoth lighting plan by Greg MacPherson, the

sound by Scott Lehrer, and the costumes by Crystal Thompson. Rob Reale wrote the song with his brother and the performance was stage-managed by Hank Meiman with music direction by Irwin Fisch, whose last foray was our 10th anniversary show.

Never a bunch to quit while they're ahead, these teens forged on into their second big project of the year: rehearsing and presenting lengthy scenes from modern plays. The icing on the cake was a performance at the beautiful, new, and conveniently located **Ars Nova Theater** (thanks, **Jenny Wiener** and **Jon Steingart** of **Mosaic Entertainment**, for hosting our little production!), right around the corner on 54th and 10th.

The first two scenes (directed by Chris Ceraso and Michael Bernard/Cecilia Arana, respectively) came from Kenneth Lonergan's play, Lobby Hero. Johnathan Roldan and Noel Polanco tackled the opening scene of the play, in which Security Guard Captain Noel berates his young employee Johnathan for his incessant joking and lack of ambition. following scene, the slacker security guard (Jonathan Villanueva) tries to pick up a tough rookie cop (Aisha Jabour) with problems of her own. The tone shifted a bit for the next piece, an intimate romantic scene from Proj Vet Jerome Hairston's a.m. Sunday. In a festival of hyphenation, Anju André-Bergmann and Osage Lewis-Ashley (directed, of course, by Megan Sandberg-Zakian) portrayed suburban teenagers playing the exhilarating yet tortuously awkward game of adolescent attraction.

The second half of the evening opened with Matthew Jellison and Natalie Musteata as early 20th century teenagers contemplating a dangerous stunt in Naomi Wallace's The Trestle at Pope Lick *Creek,* with direction by **Doug Lockwood**. The night ended with a pair of scenes from George Walker's Tough! The first, directed by Gus Rogerson, featured Mayleen Cancél as Tina, a pregnant teenager confronting her rather inarticulate boyfriend (Joseph Mohamed). Josh Lewis and Diana Rojas helmed the second *Tough!* scene, in which Tina (now played by Jennifer Jimenez) finally found comfort in her best friend Jill (Jaya Rosado), who kindly promised that if anyone felt sorry for Tina raising a baby alone, she would kick them to death. And thus, the evening came to a moving close.

We owe a big shout-out to **Nancy Giles** and **Jenny Pollack** for their help as well as to the generous volunteer directors who invested so diligently in this class since September. Just look at the huge dividends they got out of it! Now if only everyone would invest in the Teen Ensemble instead of all those silly stocks and bonds... *MSZ*
