Spring, as we all know, is serious anticipation time. It comes each year to the Project with an extra dollop of excitement because it begins with our annual Spring Playmaking show. This year was no different, as 10 new playwrights saw their plays produced for the very first time at the Calhoun School on the Upper West Side in Any Day Now: Plays Worth Waiting For. After a nineweek Playmaking class, and a weekend away in Kent, CT, eating great food

and staying at the homes of the Graham, Waterston, and Armstrong-Gannon families, the kids sat down at the Playwright's desk to watch the fruits of their labor.

Up first (no waiting necessary) was Best Friends Never Known written by Kyle Fargardo and directed by Reg Flowers, starring John Conlee as Brock Plack, a footballer, and Fred Armisen as Carlos Finger, a B-ball lover. Brock and Carlos were vicious sports competitors who had to consult a psychologist (John Sheehy, in a shockingly understated performance) to learn how to really listen to each other.

Up next was Flowers and Magic, written by Lily Capstick and directed by Alex Barreto. Enid Graham and Annie Torsiglieri took us on a magical journey to a place called Fairyland, where everyone is nice, but a bagel might be hard to come by. The Wondering Dog, written by Jamie Yip, and directed by Liliana Amador, featured Emilio Delgado as Jake, a deeply paranoid dog, and Riji Suh as Jessica, his stressedout owner. They both felt better after a chat. Fetch followed.

Bullies, written by John Cacomanolis and directed by Josh Lewis, starred Carlo Alban as Billy Bob, a steak-loving squirt who tries to alter his physique to fend off Alex, (Brienan Bryant) a contemplative bully. Unfortunately, things go a bit awry and he ends up being buffer than The Hulk. Muscles bulged, potions splashed, and the scrawny nerd got his revenge, proving that genetic enhancement may not be as bad as the media suggests.

More altered physiques came with Mr. TV and Mr. Camera, written by Devin Gonzalez, directed by George Babiak, and starring David Zayas as Mr. TV, and Felix Solis as Mr. Camera. Our foam-core Michelangelo, George, helped to design the costumes, turning two agile, animated actors into ungainly, oversized props. The two appliances fought, made up, and sang a happy song that left everyone in the audience singing for the whole intermission.

Die, written by Maximo Jimenez and directed by Rick Meese, started the second act with a bang. Peter Maloney was the doomed Mr. Tree, who is celebrating his birthday when he is interrupted by Bob (David Lansbury), a lumberjack who wants to cut him down to build a road. The audience gasped every night as the lumberjack cruelly deracinated Mr. Tree, with the ironic condolence, "Happy Birthday."

Next up was In Her Shoes, written by Kiana Hernandez and directed by Patricia McGregor, with Liza Colon-Zayas as Lula, a dog who LOVES to dance, and Deirdre O'Connell as Sweetie Pie, a singing, flying, magical French poodle, who switch lives for a day and have new kinds of adventures. Evelese's Chance, written by Ashley Torres and directed by Sonia Manzano, starred Myra Lucretia Taylor in the title role as a resourceful young woman forced to take care of her brothers and sisters, and Phyllis Somerville as her feisty but asthmatic teacher Milagros De Jesus. Death and disguise led from despair to delight.

Planted in the middle of the second act was Family in Garden by Simone Lindo. Sandi Carroll directed this little nugget, which starred Rebecca Masback and Winslow Corbett as a couple of flowers who need a little time apart.

Last but far from least was It Stinks of FHN News by Arpad West. Directed Carlos Armesto, Arpad's play had Kathy Kathy Hiler and Howard Overshown in

high-strung news anchorwoman, Howard Over-shown as James Kiky, a camera man, and Reg Flowers as their boss, Robinson. Dacy's and James' love/hate relationship led to a blur of insults, slaps, duct tape restraints, papercuts, and blundered news reports.

The evening also featured a parade of outstanding outfits designed by our creative costuming trio: Crystal Thompson, Erin Chainani and Vonia Arslanian. And our ears were treated to the lovely sounds created by Vanessa Valdes and composer Greg Pliska. Kim D. Sherman performed Greg's songs on the piano. Worth waiting for indeed.

RECENT REPLAY READING READ READILY

Our latest production, The Lorraine Cohen Replay Readings, took place on Monday, June 5th, at the very comfortable Signature Theatre on West 42nd St. Playmaking Director Reg Flowers' 8-week Replay Class, which may best be described as Advanced Playmaking, resulted in 10 new plays written by Joyce Cheung, Analis "Fifi" Fernandez, Laron Holt, Zakiya Jacob, George Keller, Terrence Mack, Stephanie Marion, Andy Reyes, Luisa Santiago and Malik **Velazquez.** The audience was dazzled by such extraordinary characters as an imprisoned psychic, a pair of battling twins, a star that wants to live in the daylit sky, a parrot who learns English, a murderous duck and a homicidal rabbit, and a boxer who succumbs to brain damage.

"One of my favorite moments was going to hear The Houston Symphony together at Carnegie Hall -- Mathew's first time there, as well as the first time he had ever heard a live symphony. We had prepared by studying the Young Person's

Guide to Music, so he knew what all the instruments of the orchestra were, and we identified all the sections as we watched the orchestra take their seats. This was a full length adult sized concert, and Mathew prepared himself by reading all the program notes to me in the twenty minutes before the concert began. As the music played, he followed everything that was going on. Afterwards I asked what he thought. REALLY good was the first thing he had to say. Yeah!

"I also loved seeing him perform in Brundibar. He worked very hard all spring in rehearsal. It was so fantastic to see him on stage completely committed to his part."
