Then his or her virtuous adult partner wrote an answer play. We spent Columbus Day weekend rehearsing in the Hamptons, thanks to the hospitality of our hosts Louis and Patrice Friedman and the Vassilaros family -- John, Alex, Tonio and Stefano. Performances followed ten days later at the TADA! Theatre, here in big, bad, sinful New York.

Here's how it went for our poor sinners. Jenisse Bouret and her adult partner Pascale Armand made sure we knew that pride goeth before a fall in Jenisse's Honesty and Vanity and Pascale's And What? Jed Clarke played a ne'er-do-well so consumed by a lust for power that it took him two plays, Pablo Maldonado's The Lucky Brothers and Jed's Control to calm down and stop taking advantage of his well-meaning brother, played by Pablo. Jennifer Ramirez and her adult partner Perry Daniel were emerald with envy, as they battled the green monster (the deadly sin, not the wall, Red Sox fans) in Jennifer's The

Other Side and Perry's Tagalong. The wrath of God was felt in both Harlo Ulloa's The Bible In The Future and in Craig Cox's Sci-Fie, as kid and adult gave us a couple of very entertaining and deeply edifying Bible stories.

After meeting Moses, the crowd parted for intermission (the new Special Dark Flyer Bar tempted them sorely). In Act II, Stephanie Vamvoukakis and Sarah Petersiel treated the audience to a pair of plays about greed, Stephanie's From Rags To Riches and Sarah's Gloria And Her Mom Find Themselves In The Same Room (In Iceland). Speaking of treats, Azalea Rosario and Alex Barretto served up a double helping of gluttony, with her Lucky Number One and his Stranger In America. Unambitiously, Bryant Acosta and Drew Cortese went last, with Bryant's aptly named Sloth and Drew's Hardboiled. Both were noir-ish journeys into seamy underworlds.

# POWER TO THE PUBLIC!

Back in November, ten highly charged kids and a galvanized force of adults headed to Stone Ridge, NY where they were welcomed into the home of Steven Gorn, Barbara Bash & their son Wiley. It was a weekend of great food, great fun, and lots of time in pursuit of that spark of inspiration. Upon returning to Manhattan, the youngsters, with the help of a star-powered cast, once again lit up the Newman Theater at The Public with THE POWER OF 10: Plays That Count.

Ashley Smith's The Twins, directed by Michael Early, was the story of fraternal twins (Lizzy Cooper Davis & Paco Tolson) who leave Ouch, Ohio, to pursue very different goals in life. One touching tale followed another with Best Friends for Life by Wendell Joseph -- the story of love in a very civilized animal kingdom. Under the direction of Maria Goyanes (and the dramaturgy of Megan Cramer), Wendell's play featured Autumn Dornfeld as Rose, the Hyena; Andrew **Kelsey** as John, the Lion; and **Gus Rogerson** as a not-so-tough tiger named Bully.

Peter Dinklage played football rookie Sam to Lucas Caleb Rooney's money-grubbing dad in the dramatic play *Like Father, Like Son* by **Ethan Maldonado**, directed by **Henry Wishcamper**. The father/son drama was followed suitably by a mother/daughter comedy, The Weird Thing by



Fran McDormand as Ranger Sophia.

Aleyni Aguilar in which Jeanine Serralles plays a mother suffering from "the weirdness" that is finally cured through yoga prescribed by her daughter, played by Adriana Gaviria.

No act is complete without a show-stopping number and Tim Cain and Ed Vassallo delivered one worthy of a Las Vegas revue in Steven and Tommy, written by Hashem Hamed and directed by John Sheehy. In the play Tim and Ed, as the title characters, take on a rival basketball team headed by **Reg Flowers**, who brought an appropriate sense of height to the proceedings.

After a short Flyer Bar break, the audience returned for some delightfully scary fun, watching Mercedes Herrero battle the flu and the monster from her closet, Squishy Gummy, played by Joaquin Torres in The Purple Scary House by Armando Cosme, Jr. If monsters

in closets weren't scary enough, Lizbeth Mackay and Nancy Giles took to the woods to face their fears and one pragmatic Bear (George Babiak) in Mari Ulloa's Camping at Florida, directed by Cynthia Kaplan. The funny fright-fest continued when Wendy vanden Heuvel, as a ghost named Betty, haunted Daniel Oreskes, as Mr. MicGrumpy, in Samantha Caldona's How Mr. MicGrumpy Became Mr. MicNiceNice, directed by Kate Marks.

Dangerous faux-ninja Robert Sella presented a three-minute history of dance to a belting (and black belted) Johanna Day in Kevin Kulego's I Messed Up, directed by Evan Cabnet. Finally, love triumphed in Autumn's Nest, an operetta by Doris Alcantara, directed by Jessica Bauman, in which Ned Eisenberg (a poet) and Frances McDormand (a park ranger) fall in love while rescuing baby birds (brought to life by stage crew chief Nikki Phillips).

Composer Patrick Barnes provided the electrifying music. Greg MacPherson on lights, Maury Schott on sound and Viviane Galloway on costumes made for a powerhouse design team, all overseen by dynamic stage manager Carol Sullivan.

DESPERATE MEASURES launched with Kayelani Silva and Hera Andre-Bergmann in Destiny's Calling written by Erin Quinn Purcell and directed by Claudia Zelevansky. In this adventure, one young woman's call to superheroism was another young woman's chance to become the smartest and most scientific sidekick in history. Next up was Movie Stars written by Daniel Goldfarb and directed by Josh Lewis. In this zany jaunt, Muhammad Cunningham and Dale Fetterman played an action movie star and an Aussie actor who remake Saving Private Ryan as a musical and learn some Australian slang along the way.




